QUILOMBOLA COMMUNITIES OF BRAZIL

Quilombola communities represent 2.5% of the Brazilian population

Quilombolas are a self-declared ethno-racial group. Although some are direct descendants of escaped African slaves who established settlements, not all are.


Their unique relationship with their territory and historic path of resistance are key components of their identity.

Most are family farmers and extract natural resources from their territories.

Most live in rural areas and their land is collectively owned.


Communities are organized under associations, which act as decision-making bodies.

Quilombola communitiesofficially recognized and certified-exist in almost all Brazilian states. The only exceptions are Acre and Roraima (circled).




LAND RIGHTS

Due to their special relationship to their land, getting the official title is extremely important for quilombolas.



Believe that getting the title increased their community's political mobilization.



Believe that getting the title enhanced their community's sense of identity.

However, obtaining the official title to their lands does not guarantee improvements in the quality of life for quilombola communities.




